Task 1

Task 3

Task 4

Look at the mistakes in your texts marked by the teacher. Are they all the same? Try to classify the mistakes into three groups below.

Group 1. Mistakes not connected to the language problem I've worked on

Group 2. Mistakes caused by not using the rule I developed

Group 3. Mistakes caused by the problem in the rule I developed
