The tasks below will help you to find out to what extent the language problem you have been working on is resolved.

### Task 1

Put down the problem you have been working on filling in the template below:

Look at the following list of topics:

Choose some of them and write 7-10 sentences about yourself. In half of the cases don't give a true answer.

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### Task 3

Join in pairs. Exchange the texts you've written. Think of questions you will ask your peer to find out which of his/her sentences give wrong information.

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Talk to the peer, ask your questions and check if you can say where the person told a lie. While you are taking, the teacher will check the accuracy of your sentences.

### Task 4

Look at the mistakes in your texts marked by the teacher. Are they all the same? Try to classify the mistakes into three groups below.

*Group 1. Mistakes not connected to the language problem I've worked on*

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*Group 2. Mistakes caused by not using the rule I developed*

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*Group 3. Mistakes caused by the problem in the rule I developed*

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Decide to what extent you've resolved the language problem you've been working on and if it's necessary to continue working on this topic.

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
